Historically, Canadian forests were frequently managed with an emphasis on timber extraction and profitability, which resulted in <u>environmental deterioration</u> and strained community relations.

In Canada, community forestry has developed from industrial resource extraction practices to a holistic approach that takes into account varied stakeholder interests, indigenous knowledge, and ecological well-being. Despite this, a <u>paradigm shift</u> has occurred because of increased environmental awareness and recognition of indigenous rights. Due to this shift in consciousness, community forestry emerged as a contemporary, sustainable approach to forestry.


Sharing the economic benefits
